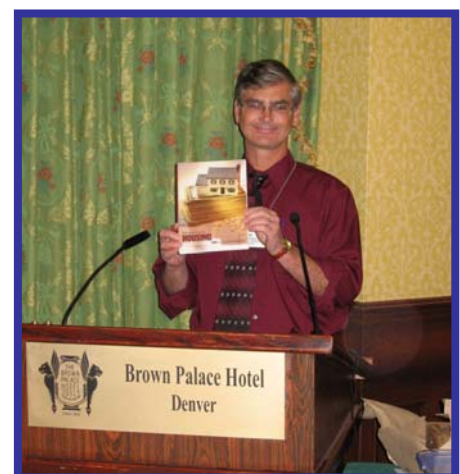

- Our annual conference in Denver, "Healthy Home Environments," was a wonderful success. We had over 80 attendees, interesting and timely speakers, and a great time getting "recharged" by our colleagues. Thanks Ken and LaVon for a great job!
- We're on Amazon! *Introduction to Housing* is complete and being adopted for housing classes. This has been a major effort for our organization and I believe we will reap benefits beyond a great textbook. Thanks to all of the many members who wrote chapters for this book, those who reviewed the chapters and a special thank you to the editors for all of their work to make this happen. Teaching activities have been sought for the text book web site that will support the book. The HERA Academic Section will continue efforts to promote the book. As the textbook is adopted and sells, HERA will begin to receive profits and an ad hoc committee has been established to make recommendations about the use of these funds.

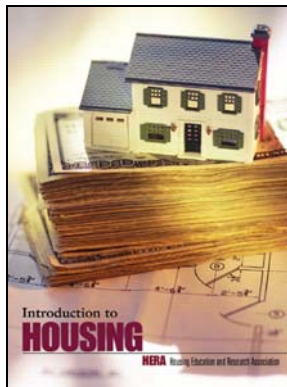
### **HERA Headquarter News Bits - from Mike Vogel, Executive Director**

## NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE HERA CONSTITUTION

A review of HERA’s financial records by the Board of Directors revealed an inconsistency in our reporting period. The current HERA constitution states:

**ARTICLE 8. DUES AND FEES**

Section 3. The fiscal year of the Association begins November 1 and ends October 31.

The Housing Education and Research Association Board of Directors voted, at its meeting on October 7, 2005, to recommend that the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

**ARTICLE 8. DUES AND FEES**

Section 3. The fiscal year of the Association begins January 1 and ends December 31.

**Justification:**

Our financial records need to be maintained and audited based on a fiscal year that begins on January 1 and ends on December 31. This will keep our records consistent with the Internal Revenue Service reporting period and with any audits that we undertake. Also, it will also better facilitate our membership year. Although

membership renewals occur during the annual meeting, members are paying for membership from January 1 to December 31 and receive services and publications based on this timeframe. Amending the Constitution to reflect this time period will be consistent with the current practices of the organization and with IRS requirements.

**Procedure:**

Past-President Sue Crull announced this proposed change to members at the 2005 annual meeting in Denver. However, our requirements for amending the constitution require that an announcement be made in writing to all association members through the newsletter or a special mailing. **Our constitution states that two-thirds of our membership need to approve an amendment for it to pass, so it is VERY IMPORTANT for you to vote.**

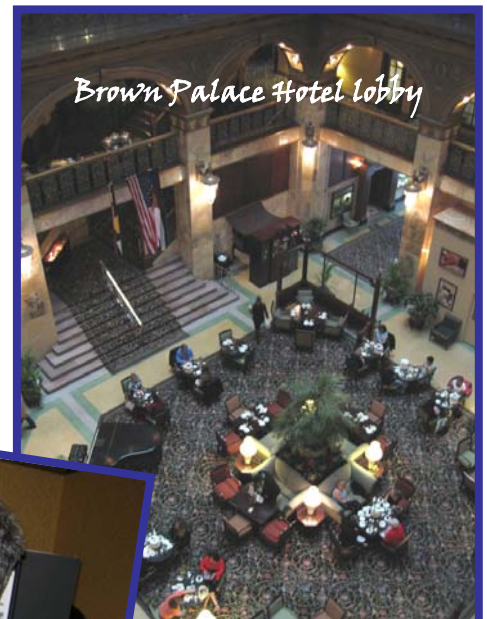

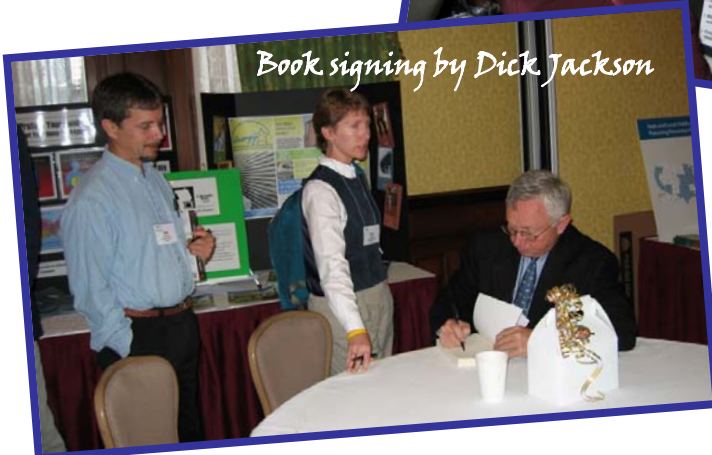
